

# **The Sacraments: Confession**

Christ's love for us is shown in the fact that he seeks the lost and heals the sick. That is why he gave us the sacraments of healing and restoration, in which we are freed from sin and strengthened in our physical and spiritual weakness. The sacrament of Confession is also sacrament of penance, of reconciliation or conversion.

Baptism snatches us from the power of sin and death and brings us into a new life of the children of God, but it does not free us from human weakness and the inclination to sin. That is why we need a place where we can be reconciled with God again and again. That place is confession.



Jesus himself instituted the sacrament of Confession when he showed himself to his apostles on Easter Sunday and commanded them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (John 20:22a-23). The parable of the Prodigal Son beautifully expresses what happens in Confession: we go astray, we are lost and can no longer cope. Yet our Father waits for us with great, indeed, infinite longing; he forgives us when we come back; he takes us in again, forgives our sins.

God alone can forgive sins. Jesus could say "Yours sins are forgiven" (Mark 2:5) only because he is the Son of God. And priests can forgive sins in Jesus' place only because Jesus gave his apostles that same authority. Many people say "I can go directly to God, I don't need a priest". God though, wants it otherwise. We can rationalise our sins away or like to sweep things under the carpet. That is why God wants us to tell our sins and to acknowledge them in a personal encounter and receiving absolution "in the name of the Father, and of the Son and Holy Spirit".

The insight (through our conscience) into our personal guilt produces a longing for to better ourselves; this is called contrition. We arrive at contrition for our sins when we see the contradiction between God's love and our sins; we resolve to change our lives by God's help. We do penance for our sins by prayer, fasting and giving help and alms spiritually and materially.

Every Confession must consist of the following essential elements: an examination of conscience, contrition, a firm purpose of amendment, confession and penance. The Church calls upon all of us to confess at least once a year. Everyone must go to Confession before receiving Holy Communion if they have committed a mortal (or serious) sin.

The Sacrament of Confession is protected by "the sacramental seal", meaning that anything mentioned during the sacrament cannot be told to anyone by the priest. Any priest who would tell another person something he learned in the confessional would be excommunicated. Even to the police, the priest cannot say or suggest anything. So important is the seal of Confession. Confession reconciles the sinner with God and the Church, we are reconciled, at peace.

## **Month of the Holy Rosary**

Wednesday begins the month of October, traditionally dedicated to praying the rosary. Please set aside some time each day to pray the rosary either as an individual, by joining us at St Mary's each morning, or as a family. Pope Leo asks all Catholics to pray the rosary daily during October for peace in our world.

The Scottish Bishops are making Tuesday 7th October, the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, a Day of Prayer for Peace. All parishes, schools, and groups are encouraged to mark this Day of Prayer both at Mass and in Public Devotions and Private Prayer.

## **Liturgical Calendar**

Monday 29th September, Saints Michael, Gabriel & Raphael, Archangels - The cult of Michael, Gabriel and Raphael began in the East. In the West, this day first marked the dedication of a fifth century church of Saint Michael in Rome. This festival of Michaelmas came to be very popular and widely celebrated in medieval Europe. Raphael and Gabriel were added to the Roman calendar in the twentieth century, and the three are now celebrated together. In the Scriptures (for example, Revelation 12:7-9, Luke 1:26-38, Tobit 3:16-25), each of the three angels is named as a messenger of God, entrusted with special divine missions on earth.

Tuesday 30th September, St Jerome, Priest & Doctor of the Church - Born about 340 at Strido on the Adriatic coast; died in Bethlehem on this day in 420. Baptised in Rome while studying the classics, became a hermit in Syria for a time and was ordained a priest. Later retained as papal secretary by Saint Damasus (11 December). Began work on a new Latin translation of the Bible, known as the Vulgate. Finally settling in Bethlehem where he founded monasteries, he devoted himself to studying the Scriptures, writing, and teaching. Often irascible and intolerant, he is remembered for his asceticism and scholarship and, above all, for his incomparable service to the word of God.

Wednesday 1st October, St Therese of Lisieux, Virgin & Doctor of the Church - Born at Alençon (France) in 1873; died of tuberculosis at Lisieux on 30 September 1897. From a devout family, she entered a Carmelite monastery at fifteen, where she embraced the suffering of her ill-health with love and in service to the missionary spread of the gospel. Known through her popular autobiography and loved for her unaffected simplicity. Noted for her humble obedience and her fidelity to ordinary duties as the path to sanctity.

**Thursday 2nd October, Holy Guardian Angels -** This feast originated in Portugal early in the sixteenth century and has figured in the general calendar since the late seventeenth century. It is based on the belief that God assigns everyone an angel to guard body and soul, an expression of God's personal care for each individual. A similar belief is also found in Jewish and other religious thought. The feast associates the human race with the eternal song of praise in heaven (Matthew 18:10).

Saturday 4th October, St Francis of Assisi, Religious - Born in Assisi (Italy) in 1181 or 1182; died nearby on 3 October 1226. The carefree son of a wealthy merchant who gave up his inheritance to embrace utter poverty. Under a simple gospel rule, he and his Friars Minor were authorised to be mendicant preachers. His "Canticle of the Sun" captures his lyrical spirit and sense of oneness with all creatures. An outstanding example of the beatitude "Blessed are the poor in spirit." At the end of his life he bore in his flesh the marks of Christ's suffering. Noted for preaching the poor and crucified Christ in both word and deed.
