# Malise Charles Robert Monteith 1952 -2022

The Monteith family's connection with the Lanark area began around 1819 when Henry Monteith, a wealthy factory owner who became the MP for the Lanark Burghs constituency, acquired the Carstairs Estate.

In 1846 Henry's son, Robert, became a Catholic, whereafter he was a generous benefactor to the Church, providing the funds to build the original Saint Mary's, along with a school and a presbytery; he gave funds for the purchase of the Cemetery, and founded the first hospital to have been created in Lanark since the Reformation, as well as assisting other causes, in Scotland and beyond.



Towards the end of the nineteenth century the family's fortunes declined, and Robert's son, Joseph, sold most of the Estate, moving thereafter to Cranley, which has remained the Monteiths' home to this day.

The late Robert was born in 1952, the son of Colonel R.C.M. Monteith, generally known as Michael, and Mira, nee Fanshawe. Having begun his education at Carstairs Primary School, Robert went on to Ampleforth College in North Yorkshire, where he spent his happiest days, making friends who remained steadfast throughout his life.

Later, Robert studied agriculture at Cirencester, whereafter he undertook a variety of occupations, before settling at Cranley.

Like previous generations of his family, Robert was a devoted member of the Order of Malta, participating enthusiastically in its activities, including the provision of services to sick pilgrims visiting Lourdes, and he was deeply influenced by the Order's spirituality; his active involvement as a Knight declined only towards the end of his life, when driving became difficult for him.



Personally unassuming, and not the most worldly of men, Robert never lost faith in God and His Providence, even when affected by serious illness. He seemed to be barely aware of the regard in which he and his family were held, and would likely have been surprised at the extent of the sorrow felt by the Catholic community of the district, and by others, on hearing of his death.

May he rest in peace.

### The Triduum

What Happened on Maundy Thursday? On Holy or Maundy, Thursday, in an upper room, Jesus and His disciples shared the Last Supper. On this day, Jesus washed the feet of His disciples and broke break with them for the last time. Still celebrated today as a part of many congregational traditions, the bread broken and the wine shared represented the body and blood of Christ, to be broken and shed for the disciples, and all of us. During the meal, Jesus predicted His betraval by one of them and Peter's denial.

What Happened on Good Friday? Good Friday was the last day of Jesus' life on earth before His resurrection. He was betrayed by Judas, as predicted, and denied by Peter, as predicted. His disciples scattered. He was arrested and was placed on trial falsely. He was condemned, beaten, mocked, and required to carry His own cross to the place where He was crucified and died. "The soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head." Though he was offered something to dull the physical pain, Jesus refused. He chose to face the pain of death head on. They stripped Him of His clothes and cast lots for them, fulfilling another prophecy.

Why Is it Called Good Friday? "It's called Good Friday because, by Jesus' death, he became the final, complete sacrifice for our sins. We couldn't have erased our sins. Our hands would have been forever stained with every single sin for a lifetime. But Jesus broke the bonds of death and sin!".

What Happened on Black (or Holy) Saturday? Jesus' body rested in the tomb on Holy Saturday; it was a rich man's tomb, fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah 53:9. Preparations were made for Jesus' body and placement in the tomb until 6pm, when preparations for the Sabbath began. There are varying theories as to where Jesus' soul was in between His death on the cross and His resurrection. The Bible doesn't really say too much about where He is at. From His statement to the criminal on the cross, "you will be with me today in paradise," we can only assume that He was in the presence of His Father in heaven on Holy Saturday.

What Happened on Easter Sunday (Resurrection Day)? On Easter Sunday, Jesus rose from the dead, fulfilling the prophecy. Early in the morning, the women who had prepared the spices before the Sabbath returned to Jesus' tomb to find it empty. Mary Magdalene arrived first.
